Principle of Continuous Improvement

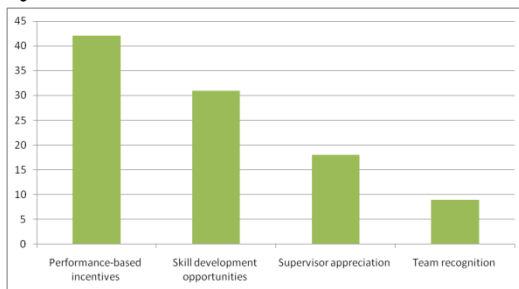

improves motivation and enables the adaptation to current trends.

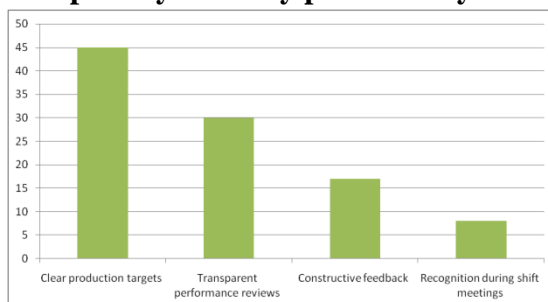
4. RESULTS

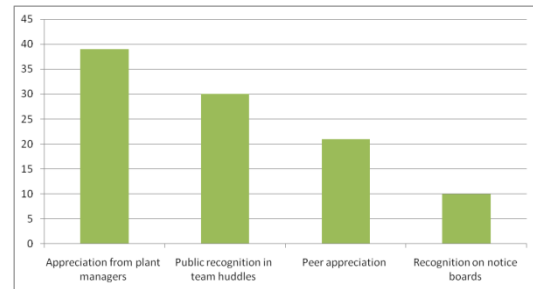
2. What is the extent to which the Ashok Leyland plan that follows motivates you to improve your daily productivity?

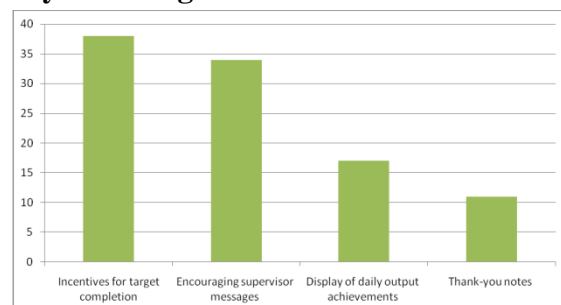
effectiveness. This suggests that employees prefer evaluation processes that are transparent and explicit.

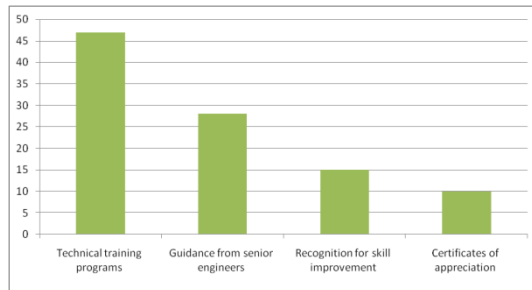
4. What is the key to your consistent punctuality in submitting Ashok Leyland assignments?
