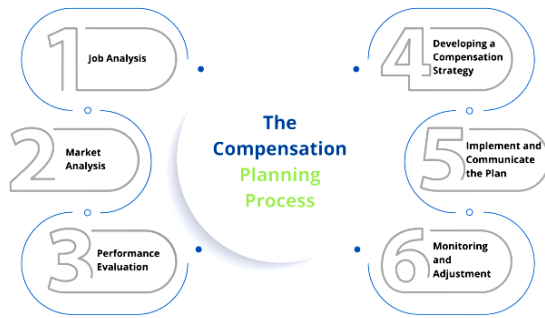
benefits, and incentives. Research indicates that equitable compensation boosts employee loyalty.

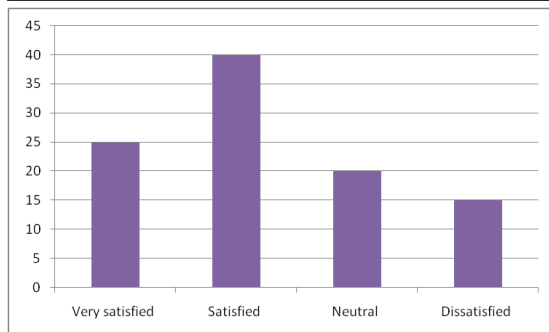

1. Does Hyundai Motors offer sufficient compensation information?

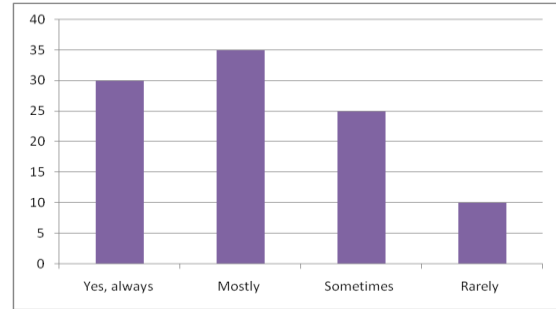

2. Are salary scales visible to Hyundai Motors employees?

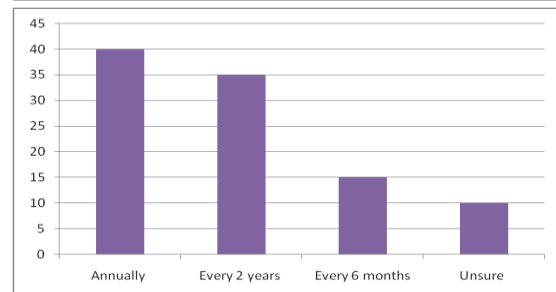

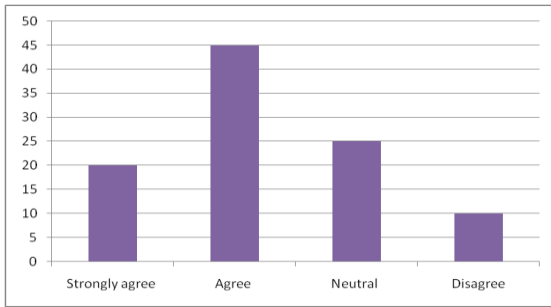


INTERPRETATION: Annual or biannual assessments are preferred by 75%. Merely 25% desire evaluation periods that are less detailed or more constant.

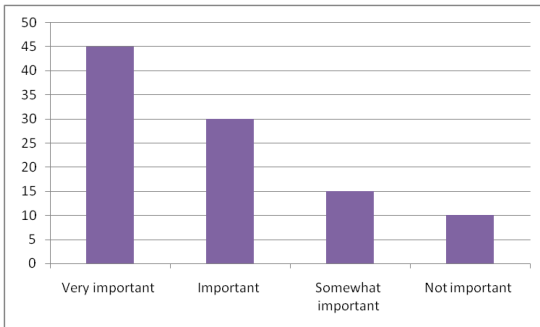




INTERPRETATION: 65% of those who agreed or strongly agreed expressed happiness. of those surveyed, 35% disagreed or were undecided.
